All this is connected to this wonderful star cluster signifying the Maori New Year.

#### Mānawałıa a Małarıkı - Celebrate the rising of Matariki

Friday 24th June 2022 marks an important milestone in which Aotearoa prepares to celebrate Matariki as our first public holiday that recognises te ao Māori and Matariki.

#### What is Matariki?

Matariki takes its name from the Māori name for a cluster of stars. The cluster is also known in other parts of the world as the Pleiades, the Seven Sisters, Makli'i (Samoa) or Subaru (Japan).

Matariki is an abbreviation of 'Ngā Mata o te Ariki Tāwhirimātea' ('The eyes of the god Tāwhirimātea'). Ranginui, the sky father, and Papatūānuku, the earth mother were separated by their offspring, one of their sons, god of the winds Tāwhirimātea, became angry, tearing out his eyes and hurling them into the heavens.



#### Why is Matariki celebrated and its significance?

When the Matariki star cluster becomes visible to New Zealand in mid-winter, it marks the start of the Māori Lunar Calendar. Celebrating the start of the Māori New Year.

- \*Matariki is a time for remembering the past, a time to honour the people we have lost.
- Matariki is celebrating the present. It is a time to appreciate what we have.
- %A time for reflection and looking forward to the future. It is time to consider what the future holds.

#### How to find the Matariki Star cluster?

Start with the three stars of Tautoru (Orion's Belt) left of Tautoru you will see a triangle shape set of stars Te Kokotā, just to the left of Te Kokotā you will come across a cluster of stars - this is Matariki (Pleiades).

# What Stars make up the Matariki Cluster?

Matariki is the star that means reflection, hope, our connection to the environment and the gathering of people. Ko Matariki te whetu e tohu ana i te huritao, i te manawa ora, i tō tātau hono ki Te Ao Tūroa me ngā huihuinga o ngā iwi.



Pohutukawa is the star that represents our loved ones passed on. Ko Pohutukawa te whetū e tohu ana i Te Hunga kua huri ki tua o Te Ārai.

Waitī is the star that represents all fresh water (Lakes, Rivers) and food sources that come from them. Ko Waitī te whetū e tohu ana i Ngā Wai Māori katoa (ngā roto me ngā awa) me ngā mauri kai o reira.

Waitā is the star that represents the ocean, and food sources within it. Ko Waitā te whetū e tohu ana i Te Wai Tai, me Ngā Hua a Tangaroa.

Waipuna-a-rangi is the star that represents rain. Ko Waipuna-a-rangi te whetū e tohu ana i te hekenga roimata o Ranginui.

Fupua-nuku is the star that represents everything that grows within the soil for food. Ko Tupua-nuku te whetū e tohu ana i Ngā Hua a Haumie, a Rongo-mātāne.

Fupua-rangi is the star that represents everything that grows or lives in trees fruits, berries, and birds.
Ko Tupua-rangi te whetū e tohu ana i Ngā Hua o Tānemahuta; ngā hua rākau me ngā manu.

 $rac{1}{8}$ Ururangi is the star that represents the winds. Ururangi te whetū e tohu ana i Ngā Hau a Tāwhirimātea.

Hiwaiterangi is the star associated with granting our wishes, and realising our aspirations for the coming year. What is your wish? E pā ana te whetū Hiwaiterangi ki te whakatinana i o tātau tūmanako me te whakatutuki i o tātau wawata mo te tau kei te heke mai. He aha tō tumanako?
